It has been 3 weeks since I have returned from long service leave and I thank everyone for their work in the first 3 weeks of Term 2. and it is now Week 7!

Over the past fortnight multiple meetings have occurred to finalise planning improvement projects about to be embarked upon, some will be completed during the holiday period, others rolling out over the next 2 Terms and will not be completed until Christmas 2017.

The projects include:

Curriculum News —

Collaboration is key to students learning. The statement above I've read before—in lots of different publications, articles and books, but what does it really mean, and what does it mean educationally? Collaboration is a shared educational experience. It can take the form of working on a problem. solving and looking for solutions. It can take the form of mentoring. The idea that one student helps another with a task or during an activity. Its also a way of measuring a students ability to work within a team. To understand the concept of rules around how that process works, and how we can

make teamwork the key to solving issues and working through problems. KPS is big on collaboration. You see it in our kitchen, in classrooms, in the yard, in our SLC and in dance, drama and music. We collaborate on math challenges, on written explanations, on cleaning the yard and helping a friend. Collaboration is key. We try really hard to provide our students with opportunities to work with their peers. To work across


curriculum areas and to work in cross aged lesson structures and activities. Collaboration. One of the most important skills we as teachers can give our students.

RED 1 — Steph Johnson



Mathematics

We are investigating 2D and 3D shapes. We are making shape models, using geo-boards and naming shapes. We are enjoying a free 4 week 'Mathletics' trial which we can also use at home!
